



Long Beach Township (LBT) Caucus & Public Meetings Monday, February 5th, 2024

HIGHLIGHTS

LBI Beach Replenishment New Update. Last month, the Township reported that LBI's beach replenishment schedule had changed and would, most likely, be pushed back to the Fall of 2024.

Once again, that schedule has changed. The Army Corps of Engineers now expects to request bids for the necessary work in March and the contract is projected to be awarded as early as April. That means work could begin in the summer.

Township officials have no information yet on the actual work schedule or locations since that will all be determined as part of contract award. Based on past experience, however, they opined that work usually begins in the south and advances northward as the effort progresses. More details to follow as they become available.

Rusty Water. Commissioner Meehan said that Township personnel would endeavor to use Nixle to alert homeowners in the future whenever rusty water appears. The commissioner explained that occasionally during routine hydrant flushing, a water main breaks, which can cause homeowners to experience unexpected rusty water.

ORDINANCES

Proposed On First Reading. First-reading ordinances are usually available on the LBT website by the Friday following each public meeting. Click on [LBT First Reading Ordinances](#) to access the Public Information tab on the website.

24-02 & 24-03 Bond authorizations in the amounts of \$235,000 and \$965,000, respectively, for equipment for the Water/Sewer and Public Works Departments.

23-04 Clarifies parking space requirements for new construction. Essentially, each required space must have adequate ingress and egress to the street.

24-05 Establishes landscaping fees, requires construction permits for any plantings over 12 inches in height and revises upward the distance plantings must be from public roadways.

23-06 Requires businesses to have insurance certifications and "Mercantile" licenses for commercial establishments with outdoor seating.

Passed On Second Reading

24-01 All municipalities in New Jersey are annually required to pass an ordinance that states salary ranges for every employee's position. This ordinance fulfills that obligation.
